LOOP CREEK "S.O.S." <u>SAVE OUR STREAMS</u> LARRY ORR



The fifth WV DEP Volunteer Save Our Streams (SOS) survey for Loop Creek was conducted by KVCTU on Saturday, April 14. Nine KVCTU members were present along with two Southern Appalachian Labor School representatives accompanying four children.

The day was cloudy with occasional light rain. The stream flow was 7 cubic feet per second and this

is low for April. The bug count was 743 with 15 total taxa (aquatic organism types) resulting in a marginal stream index of 54. This stream index is lower than previous surveys and is probably related to the large number of very small non-biting midges that we found. There was a noted increase in the amount of algae present. This algae increase may be from increased nutrients which the new waste water treatment plant would not remove.

The Riffle Index was 4.27 with an integrity scale of 93.5. The sand count from the Pebble Count was 17 which is an increase from previous surveys. We still think this may be from road work associated with the Frasure Creek Mine that has caused increased turbidity in Loop Creek and also stream crossings for the pipeline installations related to the new wastewater treatment plant.

The lower stream index and higher sand count could reflect an impact from the mining activities and the waste water treatment plant, but additional surveys will be needed to see if the trends continue. People fishing Loop Creek are encouraged to have a camera

and record any evidence of stream discoloration from tributaries, such as Taylor Branch or Open Fork.

The next survey will be conducted on Sept. 29, 2012.

Many good citizens gathered at Elkhorn and Ashland for the Elkhorn Creek Watershed Association cleanup on April 21, 2012. There were at least 56 people involved in the cleanup efforts including area residents, Trout Unlimited volunteers, County officials, State officials and Walmart employees. I have not included in the count the Mayor of North-

fork and his 3 helpers and two or three families that Becky got involved in Elkhorn. Organizations represented in the cleanup efforts included the Elkhorn Creek Watershed Association, the McDowell County Solid Waste Authority, WVDNR, WVDEP, and several Trout Unlimited chapters. Most of the volunteers came from West Virginia, but there were also volunteers from Virginia, Maryland, Indiana, and Ohio.

We were delighted to have participation from the Walmart Store in Princeton. Michael Harrison, Shift Manager, brought food to the Ashland Scenic Campground Friwork was completed. The Tug at Welch was running about 245 cfs, which was only a little above the ideal flow for working in the streams,

Ernie Nester, assisted by Max Robertson, tried to keep the volunteers organized in Elkhorn. The volunteers cleaned the trash from Elkhorn Creek from the site of the twin RR bridges above the upper house in Elkhorn down to below the lower house in Elkhorn which is about 1.1 miles of stream.

Jack Williams, assisted by Bubba Holt, led the group that gathered at the Ashland Company Store to work on the North Fork of Elkhorn Creek. They cleaned the entire stream in Ashland, most of the stream from Ashland to McDowell, and the entire stream in McDowell. They also cleaned most of the stream in Crumpler. Jermy Yahya and Gary

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EMERGER PATTERNS—SIMPLE! REPRINTED FROM THE MAY 2000 TROUT LINES BY LARRY ORR

Three emerger patterns that are my favorites were listed in Ernie Nester's article on Favorite Trout Flies in the April 2000 issue of Trout Lines. These emerger patterns all use the same basic tying technique. Charlie Nichols taught me how to tie this basic emerger pattern during one of our many outings on the upper Elk River. Charlie actually got the pattern from Sam Knotts who is a guide on streams in that area of the state. Sam tied a larger version with more dense use of material. Charlie streamlined the pattern and lightened up on the use of material. We were having tremendous success last year on a size 14 Sulphur emerger tied ala Charlie on the Elk River one late evening in June. Sam was on the other side of the river and was having no success. When we finally got together on Sam's side of the river, Sam asked us what we were using. We told him that we were using his pattern and he was surprised, since that was what he was using. When we compared the tying techniques, we decided that Charlie's streamlined version would let the emerger pattern lie lower in the water and that was the key to success. Whatever the key to success, I have used this basic technique for tying flies to imitate a number of emergers and have had good luck with them.

I am listing three different emergers and the materials used for each. The emergers are the Sulphur, Gray Fox and little Blue Winged Olive. The recipes are listed in the table below:

The accompanying photo shows the three patterns. Since there are no unusual tying techniques required, I will not go in to a step-by-step explanation of the patterns. The Antron yarn tied in similar to a tail represents the "trailing shuck " that the emerger is attempting to shed so that it can fly. The gold thread used for ribbing can be purchased from a fabric store.

The colors can be varied to match any of the mayfly emergers.

I have had good success with these patterns in





the last year. Ernie Nester and I used the Little Blue Winged Olive on one of our favorite southern West Virginia trout streams this past winter to solve the mystery of

fish that always seem to always be rising but never would take any of our previous offerings.

Give it a try! Good Luck!
